## Sibling Section

Dear Friends:

My name is Andrea Keller. I lost my younger brother and only sibling, Jon, on May 2, 2009. I am rebuilding an adult sibling loss support group thru TCF Potomac chapter as well as other venues.

I wish I was writing to you for a different reason.

I want to first say that I am so sorry to hear about the loss of your sibling. I attended a couple meetings of The Compassionate Friends ("TCF") Potomac chapter several months ago and while I know my parents have found it to be very helpful to them, my grief was profoundly different from theirs. Since I am not one to shy away from a cause that I believe in, I have made it my mission to find and create other forums for adult siblings who, like me, need somewhere to go where they can vent their grief to other siblings that understand the type of grief that we are going through.

Here are the ongoing events that are open to all grieving adult siblings...

1. There is a group that is sponsored by the Montgomery Hospice at their Gaithersburg location in the Cottage. The program is for adult siblings only and runs for a six week term, meeting on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 to 8:30pm. There are no fees associated with this group. There are two fabulous facilitators: Carol and Lorine. Neither has lost a sibling, but they've had a lot of experience and are always well-received. The current group began on April 20th and has 6 members.

2. The Compassionate Friends Group (TCF) Potomac Chapter meets the first Tuesday of each month that is ongoing. They meet at the Potomac Presbyterian Church at 10301 River Road, Potomac, MD 20854. If you are interested, I would be more than happy to arrange to have a facilitator for us at the TCF meeting, or we can just meet informally there as a group. So far, we have not had a sufficient number of adult siblings present to establish our own siblings group under the auspices of TCF. But check out option #3 in this regard.

3. A group of us have been meeting informally at La Madeleine in Rockville the first Saturday of each month at 10 am. It is low key and without a facilitator. Toby Rabbin may be able to offer us the use of the Cottage for these Saturday morning get togethers.

4. If you are on Facebook, I have formed a support group of siblings and you can reach out to me there anytime - Andrea Blank Keller - or thru my email: [andrea@kellerprinting.com](mailto:andrea@kellerprinting.com).

5. Also, I created a closed group on Facebook just for siblings to post comments or any thoughts they were having in a forum where a response may or may not be expected or needed. This invite only group (Adult Sibling Loss Support Group - MD/DC/VA) is a place to voice those feelings to people who are going thru the same experiences.

6. Another group that I have participated in is the weekly TCF online support group chats that is for siblings only on Thursday nights from 9-10pm. To sign up, go to the website which is:

I hope at least one of these adult sibling support groups will be of interest to you. Please feel free to email me with any other options you know of or just to provide feedback. I am here for you and would be happy to help if I can.

## **Dangers of Driving Drowsy**

On January 26, 2008, my daughter, Nicole Lee, was killed in a car accident when the driver, a 19 year old male, fell asleep driving and missed a curve in the road hitting a tree at 55 MPH. To make others aware of the **Dangers of Driving Drowsy**, Nicole's family and friends **will be manning the Maryland** Welcome Centers/Rest Area (on I-95 between RT 216 and RT 32 in Howard County), from 10-4pm, Friday May 14 to provide coffee and information on Drowsy Driving.

Drowsy Driving is something that affects families through out the US everyday. Thousands of deaths occur each year due to **drowsy driving**. Many people are aware of the effects of alcohol on driving but do not realize that being sleepy and driving is as dangerous as being drunk and driving. Sleepiness impairs judgment, performance, and reaction time as much as alcohol. According to the Nation Sleep Foundation more then half of adults have driven sleepy and 20% have actually fallen asleep at the wheel. ## Letter From The Editor

I started writing this newsletter introduction in December as the first snow was quietly falling, long before the next storms blanketed the area with unbelievable amounts of snow and creating chaos for days and weeks over the entire winter. Now, we are looking at forsythia and crocuses bursting through the otherwise drab vista. My name is Katherine Bloom, and I have volunteered to be the new editor of The Compassionate Friends Newsletter. With the help of my new friends, I hope to be able to bring news, announcements, stories, poems, love and ideas to the Potomac Chapter.

For a little background, I will briefly tell my story and how I came to Compassionate Friends.

My beloved daughter, Kira, died on May 21, 2009. In a season of life and renewal, she lost her struggle against a deadly, yet silent killer of young women, and some young men. She died of sudden cardiac arrest from the effects of the eating disorder, Bulimia, she battled for years. She had just turned 25 last March, and left behind not only her forever grieving immediate family, but also a baby boy and his father. Kira's story is the tragedy we will endure for all our lives. Her son, Lex, will only know the love of his mother through our stories. His first birthday was on December 25, 2009, Christmas Day.

A counselor I knew recommended I go to a support group, and gave me the website for Compassionate Friends. Kira's father, Larry, and I waited a few months before we could even consider going to a meeting. Neither of us had ever been to a support group of any kind, and this type seemed almost too unbearable to attend. Yet we did, and in so doing, found a community of people who share our collective grief and truly understand the path we now sadly travel together.

This past December, The Compassionate Friends held its Annual Candle Lighting ceremony. It was the first I attended. It was an evening of profound sadness, yet

also of hope. The guest speaker, Chuck Collins, gave a courageous and impassioned speech. Chuck told us of the terrible loss he and his wife Kathy endured by the terrible loss of their daughter, Tiffanie, a young college student. The struggle he and Kathy went through in the years afterwards, and the choice they made to live their lives for their two young sons, and for others, was inspirational. Chuck and Kathy work tirelessly for Compassionate Friends, and Chuck has written a book called : Searching for Hope When a Child Dies. Chuck's talk was filled with honesty, emotion and hope. As I sat and listened, I felt the room was embraced by his compassion. Chuck talked about the incredible emotional and physical suffering he and Kathy endured after Tiffanie died. He bravely spoke about their thoughts of ending their own lives, so as not to feel more pain. He talked about the isolation, the so-called well meaning friends who think time will heal all wounds. As they worked through their grief in the ensuing years Chuck talked about how working with The Compassionate Friends gave their lives added meaning. We are all grateful for his encouragement and kindness.

Afterwards, the group held the Candle Lighting Ceremony. We honored our children, one by one, quiet tears falling. Some said a few words to their lost beloved child, some lit candles in sorrowful silence. For some, it marked another year of not being with their child, and for some, like me, it was only the beginning. The ceremony is one of sharing, yet intensely personal for each of us. It was an emotional and touching moment, and one I will never forget.

As the new editor, I welcome every member of the Potomac Chapter of Compassionate Friends to offer suggestions for the upcoming editions of the Newsletter, personal stories you wish to share, poems, book reviews, and any other information which members may find helpful. As we go along this journey together, it is my hope the newsletter will help bring us a little closer, and go forward, one step at a time.


## POETRY CORNER
